1 Kings 11:1-10

Proverbs 19:3

- 1 Kings 9-11 Disobedience Of Solomon Leads To The Dismantling Of The Kingdom.
- 1 Kings 11 Is a Reversal of many achievements of 1 Kings 2-10.
- 1. Verses 1-8 Disobedience To God's Word
- 2. Verses 9-13 Ignoring God's Warning
- 3. Verses 14-25 Resisting God's Discipline
- 4. Verses 26-43 Opposing God's Servant

1. Verses 1-8 - Disobedience To God's Word:

1 Kings 11:1

"Now King Solomon" – We left off in 1 Kings 10:14-29 which describes "Solomon's Splendor."

"Now King Solomon loved (to have an affection for) many foreign women"

Solomon's Marriage With Egypt: "along with the daughter of Pharaoh" – He secured a bride from Egypt, 1 Kings 3:1; 9:24.

Solomon purchased horses and chariots from Egypt – 1 Kings 4:26-28; 10:26-29.

Psalm 20:7

His marriages and his procuring of horses and chariots were in direct disobedience to the Lord's clear commands – Deuteronomy 17:16; 7:1-6; Exodus 23:31-33; 34:15-16; Joshua 23:12-13.

"Moabite, Ammonite," – were descendants of Abraham's nephew Lot, Genesis 19:30. The Moabites – worshiped Chemosh, the chief god of the Moabites.

Ammonites – worshiped the hideous god Molech and sacrificed their infants on his altars, Leviticus 18:21; 20:1-5; Jeremiah 7:29-34; Ezekiel 16:20-22.

"Edomite," – were the descendants of Esau. They became enemies of Israel.

"Sidonian, and Hittite women," – Ashtereth was the goddess of the people of Tyre and Sidon. As the goddess of fertility, her worship included "legalized prostitution", Deuteronomy 23:1-8; 1 Kings 14:24; 15:12; 22:46.

1 Kings 11:2

Solomon's bad example in choosing wives from pagan nations created problems for Ezra and Nehemiah over four centuries later, Ezra 9:2; 10:2-3; Nehemiah 13:23-27.

"You shall not associate with them, nor shall they associate with you, for they will surely turn your heart away after their gods." – This is a quote from the Second Law – Deuteronomy 7:3-4.

"Solomon held fast to these in love." – Solomon had exhorted the people to have hearts that were "perfect with the Lord", 1 Kings 8:61.

This was a direct violation of the first two commandments given at Sinai, Exodus 20:1-6; Isaiah 46:9.

1 Kings 11:3-4

His sensual love for his many wives was more compelling than his spiritual love for the Lord, the God of Israel.

1 Kings 11:5

At least 38X in Ecclesiastes, Solomon wrote, "Vanity of vanities."

1 Kings 11:6-8

2. Verses 9-13 - Ignoring God's Warning:

1 Kings 11:9

Solomon was turning his back on a wealth of blessing God had given to him and sinning against a flood of light.

"who had appeared to him twice," – Twice the Lord had appeared to Solomon, 1 Kings 3:5; 9:2.

1 Kings 11:10

Solomon certainly knew the terms of the covenant in Deuteronomy 28-30, for he referred to them in his prayer when he dedicated the temple.

- 1 Kings 11:11 "tear" Solomon would resist.
- 1 Kings 11:29-30

Kingdom Divided: 1 Kings 12:16-19

1 Kings 11:12-13

There is no evidence that Solomon took this warning to heart.

3. Verses 14-25 - Resisting God's Discipline:

1 Kings 11:14

Verses 14-22 – Hadad attacked Solomon from the South: "Hadad the Edomite; he was of the royal line in Edom."

Verses 15-16 – David Slaughters The Edomites.

1 Kings 11:17-22

This constant irritation from the south should have reminded Solomon that God was disciplining him and calling him back to a life of obedience.

Verses 23-25 – Rezon Attacks From The North: These constant attacks were not a war but an irritation; Guerrilla fighters.

4. Verses 26-43 - Opposing God's Servant:

1 Kings 11:26

"Jeroboam" – who was a servant to Solomon, now rebels against Solomon.

1 Kings 11:27-28

Verses 29-39 – God Sends His Prophet: 1 Kings 11:29.

"Ahijah the Shilonite" – Prophets were "forth-tellers" more than "foretellers."

1 Kings 11:30-31

Jeroboam would become king of the ten northern tribes of Israel. The tribes of Judah and Benjamin remained loyal to the House of David.

1 Kings 11:32-35

So God's discipline was to divide the Kingdom of Israel; 10 tribes of the North were given to Jeroboam.

1 Kings 11:36-38

1 Kings 11:39 – "'Thus I will afflict the descendants of David for this, but not always.'" – How gracious of God to be longsuffering.

1 Kings 11:40 – "Solomon sought therefore to put Jeroboam to death;" – Classic expression "Shoot The Messenger."

"Jeroboam arose and fled to Egypt" – Moses was raised in Egypt and now Solomon created his own Moses which is Jeroboam.

1 Kings 11:41 – Some books that we don't possess, including the Acts of Solomon (possibly an official register).

1 Kings 11:42-43

Application:

- 1. Solomon's sensual love for his many wives was more compelling than his spiritual love for the Lord, the God of Israel.
- 2. Solomon Was Given Great Wisdom From The Lord. Wisdom Like A Signpost Still Must Be Obeyed Or Practiced In Order For A Person To Benefit From It.
- 3. Solomon, Upon Hearing That Jeroboam Would Be King Over The Northern Kingdom, Should Have Fallen On His Face In Repentance, But Instead He Tried To Kill His Rival: Proverbs 29:1.
