Key Passage – Ecclesiastes 12:13-14

The Name: "**Ecclesiastes**" comes from the Greek *ekklesia*, which in the NT is translated as "*church*" or "*assembly, called out ones*." It carries the idea of a preacher (or debater) speaking to an assembly of people. The preacher here presents a practical problem and discusses it, seeking to come to a conclusion.

We must note right from the beginning that this book is an examination of **secular wisdom** and **knowledge**. The book clearly states at the outset that it is limiting itself to that which is <u>apparent to the natural mind</u>.

One of the key phrases of the book is the continual repetition of the phrase **Ecclesiastes 1:3 "...<u>under the sun</u>?" Ecclesiastes 1:9 <u>under the sun</u>. That is the limitation put upon this book.**

Ecclesiastes is a collection of <u>what man is able to discern under the sun</u> in the visible world. The book does not take into consideration revelation that comes from beyond man's powers of observation and reason. <u>It is an inspired</u> <u>and accurate book.</u> It guarantees that what it reports is what people actually believe, but it is an examination of those beliefs.

The Author: No place does it directly say that it is Solomon. It could not be any other. In this book **12 times** he is called **"the king,"** Which could be no other than Solomon. He calls himself "The Preacher." **Ecclesiastes 1:1**

Ecclesiastes 1:12 I, the Preacher, have been king over Israel in Jerusalem.

When Written: 935 BC

Where it was Written: Jerusalem

Purpose: From different angles, he asks the question, **"Is life all vanity?"** Life that is viewed apart from God, which is called **"under the sun,"** is vanity, <u>but through the eyes of God, life is never in vain.</u>

6 times Solomon says, **"to enjoy life now and be grateful for God's gifts"** This should be the outlook of the believer who accepts life as God's gift to enjoy and employ for His glory.

Theme: "*Is Life Worth Living?"* The answer is "Yes! It is found by putting God first and obeying His Word." **Ecclesiastes 1:1-3**

All things are wearisome; Man is not able to tell it. Actually, "full of weariness" is one Hebrew word that ought to be translated as "*restless"*.

- **1.** On this side of heaven, there are no explanations for some things that happen. God is not obligated to tell us. (WHY?)
- **2.** We as Christians are to live on promises, not explanations, but by faith, not sight.

Ecclesiastes 2:1-11 The Futility of Wealth: Ecclesiastes 2:1

I said to myself, - notice where this course of the journey started at, "himself!"

I said to myself - or literally, "I said in my heart!" "I resolved!"

"Come now, I will test you with pleasure. Solomon used this word 8 times, - so he believed that God wanted to bring enjoyment.

So, enjoy yourself." And behold, it too was futility. Hedonism, "*the pursuit of pleasure.* "All of us instinctively feel that if we can just have fun, we will find happiness.

Ecclesiastes 11-12 The Problem Decided: A Life Worth Living

Solomon, the author, has been attempting to answer the question: **"Is life** worth living?" he concluded, **"No, life is** *not* worth living!"

Solomon gave 4 arguments to support his conclusion:

- **1.** The Monotony of Life
- 2. The Vanity of Wisdom
- 3. The Futility of Wealth
- 4. The Certainty of Death

Ecclesiastes 11:1 "**Cast your bread on the surface of the waters**" - may be paraphrased, "*Send out your grain in ships."* It would be months before the ships would return with their precious cargo, but when they did, the merchant's faith and patience would be rewarded.

Ecclesiastes 12:1 <u>Remember also your Creator in the days of your</u> youth,

Ecclesiastes 12:13-14 Life Is A Stewardship: (Fear God) Ecclesiastes 12:13

If our lives are to count, we must fulfill **<u>3 obligations</u>**:

#1. Verse 13 Fear God: fear God - Ecclesiastes ends where the Book of Proverbs begins (**Proverbs 1:7**): With an admonition for us to fear the Lord.

#2. Verse 13 Keep His Commandments: and keep His commandments, God created life, and He alone knows how it should be managed. He wrote the **"manual of instructions"** (Bible)

because this applies to every person. "This is the end of man" (his purpose in life), or "this is for all men."

#3. Verse 14 Prepare For Final Judgment: For God will bring every act to judgment, everything which is hidden, whether it is good or evil.

Application:

When Solomon looked at life "under the sun," everything was fragmented, and he could see no pattern. But when he looked at life from God's point of view, everything came together into one whole. If man wants to have wholeness, he must begin with God.

Ecclesiastes 12:13-14

#1. Verse 13 Fear God: fear God - is that attitude of reverence and awe that His people show to Him because they love Him and respect His power and His greatness.

#2. Verse 13 Keep His Commandments: and keep His
