Three groups of people: (1) Christ's enemies, (2) the needy multitudes, (3) the disciples.

John 3:30

Herod the Great - founded the dynasty and ruled from 37 B.C. to 4 B.C.

Herod Antipas - the Herod of this chapter, was a son of Herod the Great. His title was "tetrarch," which means "ruler over the fourth part of the kingdom."

Herod Archelaus ¼ Herod Antipas ½ and Herod Philip ¼.

Herod Antipas ruled from 4 B.C. to A.D. 39

Herod Agrippa - is the Herod who imprisoned Peter and killed James (Acts 12). He was a grandson of Herod the Great.

Herod Agrippa II - was the Herod who tried Paul (Acts 25:13). He was a son of Agrippa I.

Conscience – "to know with" "the soul as distinguishing between what is morally good and bad, prompting to do the former and shun the latter, commending one, condemning the other"

1. He divorced his own wife without cause. Mal 2:16

2. He married his sister-in-law, (his niece) Leviticus 18:16, 20:21

John Was A Fearless Witness. John had <u>been saying</u> The Greek makes clear "he was continually saying this," he was telling Herod to repent.

John like Elijah confronted Ahab and Jezebel - 1 Kings 18:18; 21:19, 23

Matthew 14:9 and although he was grieved, "to affect with sadness, cause grief, to throw into sorrow, offend, to make one uneasy"

Herod's action was typical of a weak man.

1. He chose to do it because he was too weak to admit his error.

2. He was more frightened of a woman's tantrums than of the

moral law.

3. He was more frightened of the criticism, and perhaps the amusement, of his guests, than of the voice of conscience.
